# BMW Unveils New Z4 Coupe

Ok, so maybe it's not the freshest news, but as an owner of an M Coupe, I'm pretty excited. Not that I'm about to trade mine in for a newer model (for a while anyway) but there's been a hole in the lineup without a two-seat coupe.

The styling is a bit sleeker than the Z3

Coupe, so it's probably less likely to be compared to a Gremlin, as I've heard mine. I've never let the opinion of a



Cretin bother me much. I thought about inviting him to race his Ford pick-em-up against my Gremlin, then I thought better of that idea. I guess *Easy Rider* left an impression on me. But I digress.

The base Coupe will be powered by the 255 hp 3.0 magnesium/aluminum inline 6. There's also word that the Coupe will be offered in an M version, which as you know has never made the lineup in the Z4 roadster. The M will carry the 3.2 liter S54 engine, pumped up to 343 hp, which

will make it quite a bit more powerful than



the Porsche Cayman. You can bet there will be comparison tests in the automotive media. I'll be putting in my requests for

test vehicles straight away.

I've always felt a sporting car should have a real roof, and I've never been fond of the

styling on the Z4 (it just looks a little dismembered to me), so I'm doubly glad to see the new Coupe.

Unfortunately, we won't get to see the new Coupe in the steel until June. The M Coupe should bow about the same time as the 3.0 liter



"standard" Coupe. Prices are speculated to be \$35k and \$45k. Sandia BMW may have more information by the time you read this.

## Tech Tips

# When Good Parts Go Bad

Our tech session on December 8, held at Sandia BMW, started off with a demonstration by Peter Limones of some failed parts and a discussion of some of the recent technological features finding their way on to new BMWs. One of the interesting items is the electronic thermostat. And of course there was a discussion on the pros and cons of run-flat tires.

Our tech advisor, Jim Johnson, then covered some general issues before diving into his main topic for the evening. Jim touched on the fuel issue again (ethanol bad, Top Tier good) and warned everyone to keep their air pressure over 30 pounds. Low profile tires and low air pressure can spell disaster for rims. Remember, colder air temperatures will decrease a tire's air pressure.

Jim presented a lot of points to look at when buying a previously owned BMW. This is an important enough topic that I felt it would be beneficial to recap his presentation for those members who can't make the drive to Albuquerque from the far reaches of the state. Before I get into that, we do need to thank BMW NA and Sandia BMW for the bounty of door prizes. And now, on to the good stuff:

- Check for wreck damage—cracked and/or bent panels and parts, shock towers punched upward with the bolts pointing in different directions.
- 2. Look at the tires, not just for uneven wear, but make sure they're the proper size.
- Check under the front bumper for missing or damaged panels.
- 4. Look for a power steering line leak.
- 5. Check for a coolant leak at the radiator base.
- 6. Check the rubber suspension bushings for cracks.
- Check the tie rod ends. Have someone turn the steering wheel and see if the tire moves. If there's a lot of slop, you've got worn ends.
- 8. Drive the car and check for steering wheel shake, and thumping while braking.

- 9. Look for rust. Body rust isn't the issue it once was, especially in the Southwest, but look for rusty bolts and brake lines.
- 10. Open the oil filler cap and make sure there isn't a lot of sludge under the cap and on the valvetrain.
- 11. Check the VIN tags on the fenders. Of course they should match the VIN on the dash, but they shouldn't be painted.
- 12. Make sure the air conditioning works. A retrofit from R12 to R34 could be a red flag.
- 13. The radiators tend to break at the upper mount. Make sure the hose isn't clamped all the way at the end—it could be a tipoff.
- 14. Make sure the battery is vented outside the car, and check for corrosion underneath.
- 15. Look for the BMW logo on the windshield.
- 16. Body seams should be straight and tight.
- 17. Look for cracked paint, especially on plastic bumpers.
- 18. Start the car when it's cold, and listen for squeaky belts and noisy lifters.
- 19. Look at the alternator light when you start the car; it should be bright and go out right after the engine fires up.
- 20. Also check the oil light; it should also go out shortly after the engine is running.
- 21. Breather/ventilation system: On a V8, try to open the oil filler cap while the engine is running. A bad breather will create big suction. On the I-6, you'll hear a "honking" noise while the engine is running.

The easy way to do it if you're not comfortable with your mechanical savvy, is to take it to Sandia and have them do an inspection. For less than \$100, it will be money well spent.

I've attempted to cover the important points, but obviously I can't cover the entire two hour session on this one page. Although Jim will be moving from the service area to manage the new motorcycle dealership, he is still serving as our technical advisor, and is a very approachable guy. I'm sure he'll still be willing to answer your technical questions.
