#### **Tech Tips: Electric Avenue**

My wife Heather was driving the E84 X1 last month when the dreaded "Service Engine Soon" light lit up the dashboard. As usual I was out of town on business so I told her to park it and drive another BMW instead until I could get to it...which wasn't until the end of the month.

As I plugged in my Carly diagnostic tool it had a chat with the computer on the car and quickly told me my MAP Controlled Thermostat was kaput. Since I didn't know what a MAP Controlled Thermostat was I quickly turned to the latest resource for technicians...Google. I am proud of the fact that the E84 is the last BMW made with hydraulic assist power steering. The cooling system on BMWs has been replaced a while ago with an electric water pump and hoses running all over the engine bay to keep the engine running at peak efficiency. This system is not new but ties in with the trend of removing parasitic drag from the engine (hydraulic steering) and replacing with an electrically powered alternative. In fact a similar system exists on my 2008 E92 coupe.

The MAP Controlled Thermostat works just like a regular thermostat on a cooling system for a car but has an electric heater to cheat the thermostat when the car needs to warm up quickly (like at initial start up). This allows the coolant to cycle through the engine instead of the radiator and heats up the engine faster to maintain emissions standards. When the heater goes out on the thermostat, you get the warning light on the dash. Easy enough fix once you figure out what the thing is. I only had to disassemble most of the front of the engine bay and remove the underbody panels to get to it. Then I could not find a drain plug for the radiator so I had to use the next best thing and clamp a hose, remove it and allow coolant to spray all over my garage floor and not into the catch pan I'd placed underneath...

With the onset of future fuel economy standard increases and emissions still a big issue to control, the future powertrains moving BMWs down the road will increasingly have more electric fiddly bits to keep the efficiency at peak performance at the cost of possibly being able to fix the car at home. As a mechanic I am aware that the reality of fixing my new BMW (whatever that may be) will be increasingly difficult if not impossible without the required software to talk to the car's computers to tell me what it thinks is wrong. Though repair at a dealership can be pricey it may well be the only way to effectively repair and keep new BMWs on the road past their 3 year lease agreement.
