There is a great need for you the members of the NM Chapter to step forward and carry the Chapter into the new year. Due to the events from last year the majority of your Board of Directors resigned at the end of December. I also resigned as Vice President and Editor and am not renewing my expiring CCA membership at the end of this month.

Suffice it to say the main reason of the resignations was related to a lack of respect and dignity displayed by the executive leadership of the National Office of the CCA. Their request that the NM Chapter should incorporate was on track through July of last year and then several requests from our Board for clarification were met with disdain and outright offensive language that was definitely unbecoming of personnel who are paid out of our dues to help us maintain a volunteer organization. Over several months we were left wanting in information and were finally made aware that National had held our Chapter reimbursements from August due to a decision from the executive office that was not in line with our published CCA Bylaws. Eventually the oversight was corrected in November but the damage had been done by then and we felt we could not continue to work effectively with the leadership in place in National. Personally I felt I could not associate with a group that allowed these events to even take place much less progress on for months. Ultimately I decided I couldn't renew my membership even though I have devoted a lot of time and effort to make this Chapter beneficial to all of us.

Moving forward there will need to be volunteers within the Chapter to rise to the challenge and take an active role in the leadership of the NM Chapter. The VP, Secretary and Members-at-Large are all vacant and we cannot make any decisions legally within our Chapter Bylaws as published. A Member meeting will need to be called to sort out the new leadership and plans to incorporate the Chapter in NM. It will be up to you to decide how the Chapter progresses from here.

I wish all of you the best of luck in this endeavor and hope you can continue to make the experience of BMW ownership beneficial to all.

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Tech Tips for Winter James Irick

With winter here it is a good time to check the coolant level in your BMW. The coolant has an important job in the winter keeping everything working in the cold just as it does when it's hot outside. Open your hood and have a peek at the coolant level when the engine is cold...if you open the lid when it's hot bad things can happen.

The coolant is usually measured on BMWs with the lid off. There is a dipstick inside the tank that floats to the level of the coolant in the tank. Luckily the dipstick has marks to show where the level should be. I have had to add coolant to both the E92 and E84 as well as the E36 over time although the E36 level check is easier. On older BMWs you can see the level of the coolant just by looking at the reservoir tank on the side of the radiator. It's translucent so you can see the level with marks embedded in the plastic to see where it needs to be.

You should also remember that you need to change the coolant at regular intervals to keep the internal workings of the cooling system operating at peak performance. Most newer BMWs have an electric water pump that is not part of the engine assembly and only needs to be changed when it fails...the same cannot be said of older BMWs. They have the tried and true method of using a belt to spin a water pump imbedded inside the engine block. Most engines built in the world have this technology so when the pump decides it has had enough you have to replace it. That would also be an ideal time to replace the coolant as you are starting with a new pump.
